






MEET YOUR NEIGHBOR! Polly Eilers

anning Lewis Ranch resident Polly Eilers is the definition of "good neighbor." Although she's only lived in Banning Lewis Ranch since 2018, Polly has made an incredible impact on our community. Polly is the winner of the 2022 Nominate Your Neighbor contest, which is an annual contest that recognizes neighbors who go above and beyond to make Banning Lewis Ranch the best place to live in the Pikes Peak region. The winner is selected from submissions from friends and neighbors throughout Banning Lewis Ranch. The submissions detail why a person should be the winner of Nominate Your Neighbor and list how each nominee has positively impacted the community.

No matter where she's lived, Polly has long been a proud community volunteer. She began volunteering at her kids' schools in the Chicago area because she saw that the public school system supported her children and she believed she should give back. During her time in Chicago, she helped with Special Olympics, and volunteered at the local high school and for the community Parks and Recreation department as a tennis instructor. A longtime player, her knowledge of tennis gave her the ability to teach others.



Polly's tennis experience proved to be a lifesaver during the pandemic as she provided children the opportunity to be outside with free private tennis lesson. "It really made a difference in the kids' attitudes. I made certain we adhered to COVID-19 standards and kept the courts and equipment sanitized," said Polly. This opportunity was provided by

Polly for two summers. She tried to make the lessons convenient and free to the community. Polly also has a partnership with the Rosedale Country Club in Florida that provides free, donated tennis balls to the Banning Lewis Ranch House Recreation Center.

Polly enjoys the various hiking and walking trails in the community. She loves the people that live in Banning Lewis Ranch. "The people are so willing and very excited to support each other. The dogs, children, and people make for such a positive experience. I love seeing the children have fun," Polly said.







THE PERFECT PAIR

Student, Teacher Take Big Steps Together

ona Washington is an eight-year-old who loves starting her day with "The Singing Walrus" songs, adores time with friends, and walks joyfully through the hallways of her school. One particular teacher describes her as "the happiest little girl I know."

But not that long ago, her mother, Angela Patrick, would have said her daughter's life was very different.

Iona was born with Down syndrome, and at only one-month-old, she suffered a brain bleed which led to brain surgery. "Doctors said she would never walk," shared Patrick. "It was hard ... I didn't want to give up, but I had my doubts. I thought she'd always be wheelchair-bound."

Fast-forward to fall 2021, when Iona and her mother found Inspiration View Elementary. "At first, they didn't know if they'd have the resources for Iona, but they made it happen," said Patrick. "I am so grateful they accepted my daughter with open arms." As a new first-grader, Iona was stroller bound, rarely walked, and communicated one or two words at a time.

One of the school's special education teachers, Jarrod Boswell, who works with students with severe support needs, became Iona's biggest supporter. "Iona has such a happy disposition. She can tell we care about her."

Each day when Iona arrives at school, everyone can see she's excited to be there. Her routine begins with good morning songs and greetings, social time with classmates, and then she works on goals in her Individualized Education Plan (IEP). For learners like Iona, those goals can include activities like manipulating objects, working toward number sense, counting to 10, and tracing letters.

"Her growth has been incredible. Now she can follow one or two-step directions, and she can tell us if she needs help," Boswell explained. "She will ask for help because she has spent time in a language-rich environment. She wants to do these things."

Best of all, Iona is now walking. Accomplishing this skill makes her mom glow.

It may come as a surprise, but Boswell doesn't have years of experience as a special education teacher.

It is amazing to see her growth. We've proved all the doctors wrong."

His professional background includes working with developmentally disabled adults, but his most recent job was very different. "I had been working in real estate, and I wasn't happy. I needed a purpose." He earned his teaching certificate in 2020 and landed a role in District 49 this school year.

By combining Boswell's care and compassion with Iona's new "can-do" attitude, you get impressive results. "Iona adores Mr. Boswell. She sees him and her face lights up ... if it wasn't for Mr. Boswell, she wouldn't have gotten this far," shared a teary-eyed Patrick.

And while mom gives a lot of the credit to Boswell, he attributes the young learner's success to herself. "Iona's desire to improve is the difference. She is constantly motivated, and she motivates me. It is all Iona ... she makes it easy for us ... she is loved throughout this school."

Summers can be challenging for parents, grandparents, and babysitters trying to keep youngsters entertained. If you only take advantage of the commercial venues available, it can get expensive too. Summer in Colorado also offers endless outdoor opportunities and most of them are free or very affordable.

The play's the thing

Colorado Springs and the Pikes Peak region have more parks per capita than almost any other metro area in the nation. Pick a different playground each week for different play equipment. Get out of your neighborhood and explore places like Monument Valley Park downtown, or head up to Fox Run Park in Black Forest. Each one has its unique setting and experience. Pack a picnic, too! Find all the parks at coloradosprings.gov/parks.

Take a hike

Besides getting some good exercise, taking a hike with kids can offer a multitude of learning moments. Get a field guide for wildflowers, plants, rocks, or whatever they might find interesting. You can even make a game out of identifying them! and make a game out of identifying them. Use professional guides at places like Garden of the Gods, where there are free guided hikes daily. Visit one of our local state parks (such as Cheyenne Mountain or Mueller) for more of a wilderness hike – admission is just \$9 for a whole carful of hikers. Visit cpw.state.co.us.

Explore nature

Speaking of nature, El Paso County has two nature centers. Bear Creek and Fountain, that offer

almost daily programs for kids. From identifying butterflies to learning about bears, the programs are varied and interesting. They charge a few bucks but it's well worth it. Or just stop at the visitors' center, look at the displays, and hike on your own. Staff is always helpful when suggesting routes for your group. See all the summer programs they're offering at

communityservices.elpasoco.com/nature-centers.

Ride a bike

If the kids in your charge already have bikes, this is a no-brainer. Colorado Springs has many miles of marked bike lanes. For older, taller riders without "wheels" or those who need a bit of assistance, check out Pike Ride rental e-bikes, PikeRide with rental locations throughout the region. Ride your bike to an ice cream shop and get a treat for your efforts. For more information on where to ride, visit coloradosprings.gov/bikes.

Get all wet

Put on their swimsuits and take them to America the Beautiful park, where they can wade after playing on the nearby playground. It's free, as is the Uncle Wilbur fountain in Acacia Park downtown. Or even take them over to the Cinemark theater on Powers, where jets of water shoot up and give kids a cooling treat on a hot day. Admission to Prospect Lake and





to the city's outdoor pools also is reasonable. Check that out at coloradosprings.gov/parks/page/spray-grounds-and-fountains.

Check out the library

Local libraries and branches have almost continuous programs for kids of all ages, and they're all free. Storytimes, learning experiences, guest speakers, and more will keep kids from toddlers to teens entertained while keeping cool on a hot day. You can check out some books, DVDs, or CDs to take home for more entertainment. Your library card also is free. Don't be limited to your local branch!

Attractions on the cheap

The Colorado Springs Pioneers Museum is always free! They do free family events monthly, and you can check online to see if their current attractions would interest your kids. Some local attractions have free or discounted days. Check with your favorite ones to see when they happen!

Catch a movie

Several local theaters offer cheap movie specials for kids in the summer, and you can see what's playing at The Picture Show at the Citadel Crossing Theater. There's free outdoor movies throughout the summer, and you can found out more at **peakradar.com** or **pikespeakonthecheap.com** for new listings as they happen.



FREE SUMMER ACTIVITIES IN COLORADO

veryone's on a tight budget these days. You may even have to forego your summer vacation. But wait! There's plenty of fun and free (or really cheap) things to do in Colorado this summer. We've done a little research for you.



MUSEUMS

Many museums charge admission, but some, like the Pioneers Museum in Colorado Springs, are free. Music buffs will be dazzled by the Red Rocks Amphitheatre & Visitor Center in Morrison. It offers guided tours and a Performer's Hall of Fame where you'll find autographed photos and instruments from artists such as The Beatles and John Denver.

Vail's Colorado Ski & Snowboard Museum & Hall of Fame documents the Winter Olympics, the history of Vail, and the 10th Mountain Division. Rockhounds will love the Colorado School of Mines Geology Museum in Golden. The Hiwan Homestead Museum in Evergreen and the Frisco Historic Park show how folks lived when Colorado was first being settled. For more free museums, visit colorado.com/articles/10-free-museums-colorado.

Tours

Like beer? Wine? Spirits? There are lots of free brewery, winery, and distillery tours, from Coors in Golden and Anheuser-Busch's in Fort Collins to dozens of wineries in the Grand Junction and

Palisade area on the Western Slope. Or sip a little whiskey at one of the state's distilleries. For more alcohol-related tours, most offering samples, vist colorado.com/articles/see-free-colorado-brewery-winery-distillery-tours.

Denver offers several interesting options, including the U.S. Mint, the Governor's Mansion, and capitol building tours. For details on those and more, visit colorado.com/articles/free-tours-denver-bouldercolorado-springs.



FESTIVALS

There are a number of hot air balloon festivals in Colorado every summer, starting in June and running through the fall. Most of the events are open to the public with free admission. Crested Butte has a wildflower festival each July and though there are fees for individual events, many things are free. Many towns have music festivals with some free events. Estes Park hosts a huge Scottish-Irish festival in September with both free and paid events. For more on the state's festivals, visit findfestival.com/colorado.

WILDLIFE WATCHING

Wildlife can be spotted anywhere you go in the state. To see them up close, visit one of Colorado's seven national wildlife refuges, which are always free. You might see anything from bighorn sheep to bison. For a list, visit uncovercolorado.com/national-wildlife-refuges.

SCENIC DRIVES

Colorado has more than two dozen scenic and historic byways that make for interesting day trips or weekend getaways. They all have something special to recommend them. For a list, visit colorado.com/colorados-scenic-historic-byways.






